

# **2016 COMMUNITY HEALTH NEEDS ASSESSMENT**



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# 1. Executive Summary: The Community Health Needs Assessment Process

Florida Hospital Flagler (The Hospital) in Palm Coast, Florida partnered with Florida Department of Health-Flagler, Halifax Health, and Flagler Cares to create the Flagler Community Health Needs Assessment and Planning Partnership. The Partnership conducted a collaborative, countywide Community Health Needs Assessment in 2015-2016.

## Goals

The goals of the assessment were to:

- Engage public health and community stakeholders including low-income, minority and other underserved populations
- Assess and understand the community's health issues and needs
- Understand the health behaviors, risk factors and social determinants that impact health
- Identify community resources and collaborate with community partners
- Publish this Community Health Needs Assessment
- Use Assessment findings to develop and implement a 2016-2019 countywide Community Health Plan (implementation strategy) based on the community's prioritized issues. (The countywide Community Health Improvement Plan includes the strategies included in each partners' individual Community Health Plan (Implementation Strategies), including those of Florida Hospital Flagler)

#### Methods for Engaging the Community in the Assessment

The 2016 Community Health Needs Assessment was built on input from people representing the broad community, as well as low-income, minority and other medically underserved populations. This input was solicited throughout 2016, and was gathered and considered in multiple ways.

Florida Hospital Flagler and the Flagler Community Health Needs Assessment and Planning Partnership created a multi-tiered approach to stakeholder involvement. The plan included the formation of a **Leadership Council** that included 27 leaders from 18 organizations representing key sectors of the public health system and safety net, including organizations representing low income, minority and other underserved populations.

The Leadership Council was tasked with guiding the Partnership through the Assessment process. The Leadership County met five times in 2015 and 2016 to:

- Review primary and secondary data
- Define and select the Priority Issues to be addressed in the countywide Community Health
- Develop a Community Asset Inventory
- Develop the Community Health Plan (implementation strategies) to address the Priority Issues identified in the Assessment

In addition to the Leadership Council, the community engagement process included:

- Community Health Surveys
- Facilitated Community Meetings

# Data

The Flagler Community Health Needs Assessment and Planning Partnership and Florida Hospital Flagler collected both primary and secondary data. The primary data included stakeholder input at two

Community Meetings with 58 participants, and a Community Survey (online and paper) with 584 respondents. Both the Surveys and the Meetings included people from the broad community as well as from low-income, minority and other underserved populations. Additionally, Florida Hospital Flagler considered internal hospital utilization data (inpatient and emergency department).

Much of the primary data and the secondary data included in the final Needs Assessment report was compiled by One Voice for Volusia (based in neighboring Volusia County), the agency contracted by the Flagler Community Health Needs Assessment/Community Health Plan Partnership. The included secondary data included Public Health and other publicly available data from state and nationally recognized data sources.

## Asset Inventory

The next step was a Community Asset Inventory. This Inventory was designed to help the Flagler Community Health Needs Assessment and Planning Partnership and Florida Hospital Flagler to (1) understand existing community efforts to address these particular issues and (2) prevent duplication of efforts as appropriate. The Asset Inventory was created through a web-based Community Input Survey and a Community Meeting hosted by Flagler Cares, with 33 stakeholders participating.

# **Selection Criteria**

Using the data findings and the Community Asset Inventory, the Flagler County Partnership identified 14 key health issues. Participants in the Community Meeting narrowed that list to five Priority Health and Health Behavior/Risk Factor Issues (determinants of health).

The criteria used to define the 14 and then the five Priority Issues included:

- A. How acute is the need? (based on data and community concern)
- B. What is the trend? Is the need getting worse?
- C. Does the hospital provide services that relate to the priority?
- D. Is someone else or multiple groups in the community already working on this issue?
- E. If the hospital were to address the issue, are there opportunities to work with community partners?

#### **Priority Issues**

The Priority Issues selected by the Flagler County Partnership (and the Community Meeting) were:

- 1. Adult Behavioral Health (mental health, substance use/abuse, tobacco use)
- 2. Youth Behavioral Health (mental health, substance use/abuse, tobacco use)
- 3. Mothers & Children Under Age 5 (women's health, teen pregnancy, prenatal care, birth outcomes, child health and development, early learning)
- 4. Chronic Disease: Cardiovascular Diseases & Diabetes (including the shared modifiable risk factors of healthy eating & physical activity)
- 5. Family Violence (domestic violence and child abuse/neglect)

#### Approvals

The Community Health Needs Assessment findings and selected Priority Issues were approved by the Flagler County Hospital Board in Fall 2016. The final Needs Assessment was posted on the hospital's web site prior to December 31, 2016.

#### **Next Steps**

Next, the Flagler Community Health Needs Assessment and Planning Partnership, including Florida Hospital Flagler, will develop a 2017-2019 Community Health Improvement Plan (implementation strategies) to address the priority issues. The Plan will be completed and posted on the hospital's web site prior to May 15, 2017.

# 2. Hospital Description

Florida Hospital Flagler is a part of Adventist Health System, the nation's largest not-for-profit Protestant healthcare provider system with a mission to extend the healing ministry of Christ. Florida Hospital Flagler has 99 licensed beds and employs nearly 1,000 caregivers, of which nearly 75 percent live in Flagler County. Florida Hospital Flagler continues to grow with the community and is now comprised of the hospital's main campus; Town Center Surgery, a freestanding outpatient center; and the Parkway Medical Plaza that includes a walk-in clinic, laboratory, imaging and women's center and physician offices.

# 3. Choosing the Community

Florida Hospital Flagler defines its "community" as its Primary Service Area (PSA) from which 75-80% of its patients come. Primary Service area ZIP codes include 32110, 32137, and 32164 (3 of the 4 ZIP code areas in the entire county).

# 4. Community Description & Demographics

Florida Hospital Flagler's Primary Service Area includes most of Flagler County and ZIP codes 32110, 32137 and 32164.

Flagler County, so named for Henry Morrison Flagler who built the Florida East Coast Railway, is on the east coast of the U.S. State of Florida. Flagler County encompasses 571 square miles in an area consisting of 485 square miles of land and 86 square miles of water in Northeast Florida. It is approximately 30 miles south of downtown Jacksonville with a diverse geography and culture. The Atlantic Ocean defines the eastern boundary of the county for 19 miles.

Flagler County was home to 104,571 individuals in 2016 with approximately 17.9% of the population under 18 years of age and about 28.7% who were 65 years and older. The largest city in Flagler County is Palm Coast with an estimated population of over 80,600 according to the 2014 American Community Survey. The City of Bunnell is the county seat and Beverly Beach, Flagler Beach and Marineland are the other cities in the county with over 13% of the population residing in unincorporated Flagler County.

In 2016, the median household income in Flagler County was \$46,939. The Florida Department of Economic Opportunity, Bureau of Labor Market Statistics, reported that 40,817 of the 43,502 identified as in the civilian labor force were employed in 2015, resulting in an annual unemployment rate of 6.2%.



The top three Industries in Flagler County by number of employees are Retail Trade, Accommodation & Food Services, and Health Care & Social Assistance.

Total public school enrollment (grades preK-12) increased slightly to 12,937 in December 2015 according to the Florida Department of Education. In Flagler County, 84.4% percent of residents 25 or older had a high school degree or higher and 21.7% of residents 25 years or older reported having a Bachelor's degree or higher according to 2016 Claritas data from Northeast Florida Counts.

In 2016, the Flagler County population was 82.1% white, 10.8% black/African-American and 7.1% other races or multi-racial. 10.2% of the population reported they were Hispanic.

As detailed in the tables on the following pages, residents in some geographic areas of the County and the PSA area suffer disproportionately from key socio-economic and health issues. A summary of those differences is noted below:

- 32110 (Bunnell) had a higher level of poverty and unemployment and lower median income and property values than the rest of the County
- 32110 had a lower Median Household Income than Flagler County
- 32110 had a higher poverty rate than Flagler County
- 32110 had a higher Heart Failure and Diabetes Death Rate than the rest of the PSA.
- 32110 and 32136 had the highest low birth weight rates in the PSA.

# 6. Public Health

The Florida Department of Health-Flagler was one of the four key partners in the 2015-16 Community Health Needs Assessment and Planning Partnership. The Department was represented by Robert Snyder, Health Officer.

Robert "Bob" Snyder brings more than 30 years of hospital management experience to the Health Officer position. Prior to coming to DOH-Flagler, he served in several capacities for Orlando Health, a network of community and specialty hospitals based in Orlando. In 2002, Snyder began as administrator of Ancillary and Support Services for Dr. P. Phillips Hospital (formerly Orlando Regional Sand Lake Hospital). He then

served as administrator of Master Faculty Planning in 2006 at Orlando Regional Medical Center and as president, vice president and chief operating officer for South Seminole Hospital from 2009-2012. Between 1982 and 2008, Snyder held executive and management level positions at several hospitals, including associate executive director at Humana Hospital Bennett, chief executive and operating officer at Waterman Medical Center, and administrator at Memorial Hospital Flagler.

Snyder graduated from Siena College in New York with a Bachelor of Arts and earned his Master of Public Health from the University of South Carolina. He is a former commissioner with the State of Florida Commission on Excellence in Health Care and former chairman of the Small and Rural Hospital Council with the Florida Hospital Association. Snyder is also an active member of Flagler Beach Rotary Club and a volunteer chaplain for Florida Hospital Flagler.

# 8. Community Collaboration

In 2015-16, to reflect best practices and maximize community impact, leaders from Florida Hospital Flagler, the Florida Department of Health-Flagler, Flagler Cares (informal coalition of public and private organizations providing health and related support services) and Halifax Health convened to explore a collaborative process to develop a shared Community Health Needs Assessment and Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) for Flagler County.

These pillar organizations unanimously agreed to work together for the greater good. They formed the **Flagler County Community Health Needs Assessment and Planning Partnership** by committing their time, talents and resources to support the Needs Assessment process outlined below. The process was facilitated by One Voice for Volusia, a community framework organization for research, planning and community mobilization.

The **Flagler County Partnership** entities held a common vision to improve the population health and wellbeing in Flagler County. They committed to a nine-month process of convening to review and examine county-level and sub-county-level secondary data along with supporting the collection and review of primary data in order to establish high-level and priority health issues.

They agreed to invest in the creation of this shared community health needs assessment document that contains the examined and prioritized health issues along with the data indicators and identified community assets. This shared document will then serve as a common resource for both the investing partner organizations and the many community stakeholders that will support the creation of community health improvement plans based on these findings.

# 9. Asset Inventory

An inventory of community assets (and gaps) was developed through a two-step process. The goals of the Asset Inventory were to help the Partnership understand existing efforts to address community issues and to prevent duplication of services and initiatives in the Community Health Improvement Plan.

- 1. A web-based survey was conducted to inventory existing assets and gaps. The survey was promoted among Flagler stakeholders through the Flagler County CHNA/CHIP Leadership Council, the Flagler Cares network (130 individuals) and through the Community Connector (an e-communication system in Volusia/Flagler with over 2,700 subscribers). Forty-one (41) individuals responded to the survey.
- A Community Meeting hosted by the Flagler Cares Coalition on April 11, 2016 was promoted to the Flagler Cares network. The meeting was attended by 37 individuals representing 29 different community organizations. Through facilitated large and small group discussions, participants provided input on current assets and suggested strategies to address the initial priorities.

# 10. Data Summary & Priority Selection

The Flagler County Leadership Council met on March 30, 2016, to discuss the 14 health issues that had emerged from the primary and secondary data. The 14 issues were:

- 1. Chronic Disease: Respiratory Disorders Asthma
- 2. Chronic Disease: Respiratory Disorders Chronic Lower and Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease
- 3. Communicable and Infectious Diseases: Sexually Transmitted Diseases (STD)
- 4. Communicable and Infection Diseases: HIV/AIDS
- 5. Communicable and Infectious Diseases: Vaccine Preventable Diseases Flu Shots
- 6. Communicable and Infectious Diseases: Vaccine Preventable Diseases Childhood Immunizations
- 7. Access to Health Services/Resources
- 8. Injuries
- 9. Socio-demographics/Health Determinants (poverty, employment, etc.)
- 10. Adult Behavioral Health (mental health, substance use/abuse, tobacco use)
- 11. Youth Behavioral Health (mental health, substance use/abuse, tobacco use)
- 12. Chronic Disease: Cardiovascular Diseases & Diabetes (including the shared modifiable risk factors of healthy eating & physical activity)
- 13. Mothers & Children Under Age 5 (women's health, teen pregnancy, prenatal care, birth outcomes, child health and development, early learning)
- 14. Family Violence (domestic violence and child abuse/neglect)

The issues were detailed in a 133-page document sent to each member prior to the meeting. The document included a summary of the Forces of Change exercise, Local Public Health System Assessment, 2015-2016 Community Health Survey and the latest indicator data related to each health issue.

# The communitywide 2016 *Flagler County* Community Health Needs Assessment posted on this web site discusses each issue in detail.

Members were then asked to consider each health issue through the lens of three prioritization criteria:

- A. Impact: How much does the issue affect other issues? What is the cost of NOT addressing it?
- B. **Trend & Magnitude of Difference:** Has the trend improved or worsened in the last five years? How much worse is the problem in Flagler compared to Florida?
- C. **Feasibility:** Are there successful strategies to address this problem? Is there a positive cost-benefit to addressing the problem?

Utilizing a multi-voting technique, the original 14 health issues were reduced to five initial Priority Health issues listed in Section 11 below. In addition to the five selected issues, the Leadership Council discussed the impact of poverty on all health and wellness issues and the importance of developing strategies that either address poverty directly or appropriately addresses the health disparities created by poverty.

The validation process included a Community Input Survey and a Community Meeting hosted by Flagler Cares. Forty-one (41) individuals responded to the survey and 37 individuals from 29 organizations participated in the community meeting. There was 80% or higher agreement with the Initial Priority Health Issues among the survey respondents and 100% agreement at the Community Meeting.

# **11. Key Issues to be Addressed**

The Flagler Leadership Council reconvened on May 18, 2016 for a final review of the five initial health priorities. The group consensus was to keep all five health priorities as focus areas for the Community Health Improvement Plan. The Leadership Council collaboratively agreed upon specific issues for targeted action and established existing community activities and strategies to sustain.

As the specific issues were identified for action, participating council members volunteered to champion them based on their community position and current assets. This meeting created a synergistic bridge between the Community Health Needs Assessment process and the Community Health Improvement Planning (Implementation Strategies) process by engaging the community leaders in both vital phases.

- 1. Adult Behavioral Health (mental health, substance use/abuse, tobacco use)
- 2. Youth Behavioral Health (mental health, substance use/abuse, tobacco use)
- 3. Mothers & Children Under Age 5 (women's health, teen pregnancy, prenatal care, birth outcomes, child health and development, early learning)
- 4. **Chronic Disease: Cardiovascular Diseases & Diabetes** (including the shared modifiable risk factors of healthy eating & physical activity)
- 5. Family Violence (domestic violence and child abuse/neglect)

## 12. Issues that will Not Be Addressed

Florida Hospital Flagler will include strategies that address a component of each of the five priority issues in their Community Health Plan and will work in partnership with many other organizations that are leading strategies included in the countywide Community Health Plan.

# 15. Evaluation of the Strategies Undertaken in the 2013 Community Health Plan

The Hospital conducts an annual Evaluation of the progress made on its Community Health Plan (Implementation Strategies). The Evaluation is reported to the IRS in the hospital's Form 990. The following narrative is a copy of the 2015 Community Health Plan Evaluation as noted in Form 990, Schedule H, Part V, Section B, Line 11.

Florida Hospital Flagler is located in Palm Coast, Florida. The hospital is located in the less populated western part of the city. Bunnell is the (Flagler) county seat and is included in the hospital's service area. In general, the 2,000 Bunnell residents have lower income and education levels than much of Palm Coast.

Florida Hospital Flagler's 2013 Community Health Needs Assessment identified high cholesterol, obesity/nutrition, smoking, and chronic disease (heart disease, diabetes and cancer) as key health issues. Many of these conditions are related to lifestyle and to access to health/community resources.

In 2015, the hospital provided multiple community health education programs and seminars, and tripled attendance in most of them over the past year. Efforts included work with low income populations. Some efforts, such as Change Your Life and CREATION Health, were aligned with similar efforts at four other Florida Hospital facilities in adjacent Volusia County.

## Priority Issue: Prompting Health & Wellness - Heart Disease, Diabetes and Wellness/Lifestyle

<u>2013 Description of the Issue</u>: The age-adjusted death rate for cardiac disease in Flagler County is 12.6 per 100,000 compared to 7.8 per 100,000 for the rest of Florida. Needs Assessment findings attribute the higher rate to several factors: the aging population, lifestyle factors and access/understanding of the community's health and community resources. The County's rates of diabetes and obesity are also slightly higher than the state average.

<u>2015 Update: In 2015</u>, nearly 1200 people were enrolled in the Change Your Life lifestyle membership program. In total, the Change Your Life wellness program reached 3,100 community members and hospital employees through events, physical challenges, education, online reporting and prizes. The program centered on the eight core principles of CREATION Health (choice, rest, environment, activity, trust in God, interpersonal relationships, outlook and nutrition). Over 94% of people who completed the CREATION Health part of the program reported an increase in knowledge and understanding of the importance of these principles. The CREATION Health completion rates and post-assessment scores in low-incomes areas were slightly lower than those of the rest of the county; the hospital is working to understand why.

The hospital also reached 2000 people at weekly blood pressure screenings; the goal was 350. People whose screenings were abnormal were referred to their family doctors or other affordable sources of care. Florida Hospital Flagler also provided free blood sugar screenings at multiple events, including 75 to residents in the (low-income) Bunnell community. Residents with high scores were linked to affordable health services.

In addition to CREATION Health, Florida Hospital Flagler held 19 educational seminars that engaged over 1000 people. In addition, the hospital hosted or provided meeting space to community groups for support

and education programs that address not only health issues, but social conditions. Programs included diabetes education, prostate cancer, breast cancer, head & neck cancer, cancer caregivers, lupus, stroke, step-parents, domestic violence, multiple myeloma survivors, Parkinson's disease, Gamblers Anonymous and Overeaters Anonymous.

## **Priority: Access to Health Care Services**

<u>2013 Description of the Issue</u>: Access to health care emerged as a priority for our Community Benefit plans because data showed high rates of residents without access to health care (especially primary care) and residents without insurance. Limited access to health care services can aggravate other issues identified through our research including chronic disease, mental health issues, and maternal and child health. In 2013, the community had a free clinic but lacked a Federally Qualified or Rural Health Center.

<u>2015 Update</u>: Florida Hospital Flagler worked with community partners to bring Azalea Health, a multilocation FQHC, to Palm Coast. The new center offers affordable primary care services to Palm Coast and the surrounding area. The FQHC sees patients with Medicaid and Medicare, and sees uninsured patients on a sliding fee scale. In addition, the hospital provided over 250 lab vouchers to the Flagler Free Clinic.

## **Priority: Access to Health and Community Resources**

<u>2013 Description of the Issue</u>: At the time of the 2013 Assessment, the County's 2-1-1 community resource line was sorely out-of-date, and lacked listings for health and wellness resources.

<u>2015 Update</u>: Florida Hospital Flagler worked with United Way and other community partners to update the listings of health and wellness resources in Flagler and Volusia County's 2-1-1 system. The 2015 goals and achievements were threefold: 1) increase the number of health and wellness resources listed in the county's 2-1-1 database from 0 (actual was 139); 2) increase referrals by staff to health and wellness resources from 0 (actual was 1,152); and 3) increase the number of web referrals for health and wellness resources from 0 (actual was 2,360).

# Priority: Adult Tobacco Use and Abuse programs

<u>2013 Description of the Issue</u>: The rate of smoking in Flagler County adults (2010) falls in the third quartile in the state.

<u>2015 Update</u>: 235 people completed smoking cessation classes offered by Florida Hospital Flagler (the goal was 35). The "Tools to Quit" smoking cessation program was offered on campus and in underserved areas. The hospital is also a supporter of the Tobacco Free Flagler County Partnership, a community coalition whose goal is to prevent youth initiation and reduce the use of tobacco products.

# **Priorities Considered but Not Selected**

<u>Communicable Diseases</u>: Florida Hospital Flagler did not select Communicable Disease as a priority at this time. We determined that there are groups already addressing this issue: The Health Department, Diggs Miracle Care and the Outreach Community Care Network. In addition, the hospital does not have the capacity to effectively address this issue.

<u>Injuries</u>: We also determined we are not the best community partner to address Injury, which was identified as a top priority through secondary data. Multiple community groups are working on issues like unintentional injury, violence and domestic violence in our community. These groups include the school systems, domestic abuse shelters, and governmental groups.

<u>Maternal and Child Health</u>: Maternal and child health issues were not selected as a direct effort. We believe our efforts around health and wellness and increasing health care access should have a positive impact on these issues. The hospital Maternity program offers new mother and parent support and education. The Health Department offers prenatal care for low-income women, and the Healthy Start Coalition of Volusia/Flagler offers support programs, especially for high-risk mothers. The Teen Outreach Program (TOP) in the County school system - a positive youth development curriculum that encourages Healthy Behavior, Life Skills and a Sense of Purpose - has a goal of reducing teen pregnancies.

# Appendix A: Community Health Survey 2015-2016

# Methodology

The 2015-2016 Community Health Survey in Volusia and Flagler Counties relied primarily on an Internet-based survey (which was collected using Survey Monkey) to reach as many respondents as possible within the limits of the project budget. The online survey was available in English and Spanish via

www.communityhealthsurvey.com. There were 2,150 Internet surveys collected. Paper surveys, also available in Spanish and English, were utilized to reach individuals without convenient access to the Internet and were manually entered. 530 paper surveys were manually entered.

The online and paper surveys were promoted and distributed through email communication, postings on various websites, and paper surveys made available at partner's places of business. Partners included:

- The nonprofit, governmental and business partners involved in the Community Health Needs Assessment process
- The members and partner organizations of One Voice for Volusia and Flagler Cares Coalitions
- The Community Connector, an e-blast system with over 2,900 subscribers.

The 21-questions survey, based on an instrument used nationally, included questions regarding perceived quality of life and health of the community, health concerns, barriers to health care, use of health care, health care needs and demographic information.

A total of 2,680 individuals completed the Volusia/Flagler Community Health Survey (online or via paper surveys). Five individuals completed the survey online in Spanish (no Spanish paper surveys were completed). The survey respondents were asked "Where is your permanent residence?"

- 2,003 reported that they lived in Volusia county
- 584 reported that they lived in Flagler county
- 81 reported that they lived in another Florida county
- 12 reported that they lived outside of Florida

Only the 584 Flagler respondents are included in the presentation of survey results in the following tables.

# Limitations

#### **Convenience Sampling**

A convenience sampling methodology was used for the 2015-2016 Community Health Survey. The convenience sampling process is a non-probability sampling technique that relies on the collection of data from populations within easy reach of the researcher. In this case, community agencies were asked to promote the survey with their customers, staff and other stakeholders. This method was selected for ease and budget restrictions. Convenience sampling is much different from a random sampling methodology where the survey population is randomly sampled to gain responses from every population subset.

#### Limitations and Cautions with Convenience Sampling

Convenience sampling can lead to the under-representation or over-representation of particular groups within the sample. This was the case with the 2015-2016 Community Health Survey for several subsets of the Flagler County population including males and individuals ages 18-24. It is important to understand that convenience

samples do not produce representative results because of the inherent biases. The results presented here cannot be considered representative of the entire population.

# Limitations of Internet Surveys

Although paper surveys were made available, the survey process relied primarily on the Internet survey. Internet surveys tend to underrepresent lower-income, less educated and minority households.
