Lung Cancer Education and Smoking Cessation

Background:

Smoking is the leading cause of preventable death in the U.S., causing over 438,000 deaths per year. In 2015, an estimated 15.1% (36.5 million) U.S. adults were cigarette smokers. Smoking-related illness in the United States costs more than \$300 billion a year. In the State of Florida, the adult smoking rate in 2015 is higher than the national average, and is at 15.8% (2,554,200). The annual health care costs in Florida directly caused by smoking \$8.64 billion. In 2010, the prevalence of smoking in Volusia and Flagler counties are higher than the national and state averages

Tobacco Use:

17% of Florida adults are current smokers. This is defined as those who have smoked 100+ cigarettes in their lifetime and who are still smokers. Volusia County adults surpass this percentage by 23%. Non-Hispanic Blacks (24%) and ages 18-44 (29.6%) have the highest rates.

EFFECTIVENESS OF PROGRAM

AHEC does not have the information on attendees who quit. That information is handled by the outside agency contracted through Tobacco Free Florida, Professional Data Analysts. They contact a random sample drawn from each State of Florida AHEC Center's list of clients who attended a class and gave a signed consent for follow up.

The call consists of a 6-7 minute survey and the main outcome question is "Have you used any tobacco, even a puff or pinch in the last 30 days?" AHEC gest the total quit rate for the State AHEC classes which is 36%. AHEC does not get individual quit outcomes.
